School Plan 2021-2024 - Survey

Thank you to the parents who have completed the parent survey, either directly with the school administrative staff on the telephone, via an online link or a paper version. We have completed responses from more than half of the families from the school, including detailed responses about your individual children, as well as your views of the school as a parent. If you haven't been able to finish the survey's that have been sent out yet, please complete them promptly for our consideration. Your views are very important, and we act based on them.

NAIDOC Week Celebrations

The theme for NAIDOC Week 2020 is 'Always Was, Always Will Be'.

'Always Was, Always Will Be' recognises that First Nations people have occupied and cared for this continent for over 65,000 years.

'Always Was, Always Will Be' acknowledges that hundreds of Nations and cultures covered this continent. All were managing the land - the biggest estate on earth - to sustainably provide for their future.

Through ingenious land management systems like fire stick farming they transformed the harshest habitable continent into a land of bounty.

NAIDOC Week 2020 acknowledges and celebrates that our nation's story didn't begin with documented European contact whether in 1770 or 1606 - with the arrival of the Dutch on the western coast of the Cape York Peninsula.

The very first footprints on this continent were those belonging to First Nations peoples.





NAIDOC 2020 invites all Australians to embrace the true history of this country – a history which dates back thousands of generations.

It's about seeing, hearing and learning the First Nations' 65,000+ year history of this country - which is Australian history. We want all Australians to celebrate that we have the oldest continuing cultures on the planet and to recognise that our sovereignty was never ceded.

Barellan Central School celebrated NAIDOC Week with an assembly on Monday where students showcased a 'Welcome Dance' they created. We then completed some crafts activities on Wednesday including; Basket Weaving to practise being precise and delicate, Painting to practice story sharing and fine motor skills, Dreaming and rope making to practise patience and listening, Beading to practise resilience, and Scratch art to practise using quills for art. We rounded off the week with Traditional Indigenous games to help build skills needed for traditional hunting.

Our Aboriginal students stepped up and coordinated all these days and demonstrated their leadership qualities throughout the various activities. I am extremely proud of the effort our students put in and the pride they have shown in their school and their culture. I am looking forward to many more events being coordinated by this group.

Remembrance Day

"On 11 November 1918, the Western Front fell silent after four years of continuous fighting.

More than 330 000 Australians served in the First World War and over 60 000 were never to return home. On the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month we, as a nation, take a moment to commemorate the sacrifice those servicemen and women made for our country.



Remembrance Day falls within NAIDOC week this year and this makes it all the more important for us to recognise the contribution of Indigenous Australians, not only in World War 1, but those who have served in every conflict and commitment since.

It is estimated that over 1000 Indigenous Australians fought in the First World War. When war broke out in 1914, many Indigenous Australians who tried to enlist were rejected on the grounds of race; many got through by telling recruitment officers they were Maori, Pacific Islander or even Jewish. As a result of this it is impossible to know exactly how many Indigenous Australians served before 1980, when better records were kept.

They came from a section of society with few rights, low wages, and poor living conditions. Most Indigenous Australians could not vote and none were counted in the census. But once in the AIF, they were treated as equals. They were paid the same as other soldiers and generally accepted without prejudice.

Loyalty and patriotism encouraged Indigenous Australians to enlist, but many saw it as a chance to prove themselves the equal of Europeans or to push for better treatment after the war.

William Rawlings, a horse trainer from near Warrnambool, risked his life to clear a path for his fellow infantrymen during an attack at Morlancourt on the Western Front.

He was one of a thousand Indigenous Australians who volunteered when their country did not properly recognise them or their people, and he would die just a few months before the Armistice. They saw our country not just for what it was then but what they dreamed it would become."


1/2/3 in the Poultry Shed
